*From the Pastor's Desk*

## “Ruby’s Residents”

Recently, Steve Hartman of CBS News did a story about an 11-year-old girl who was granting wishes to nursing home residents near Harrison, Arkansas. Curious, I read his article and have included for you to read below.

*“At a nursing home in northwest Arkansas, we found a gem named Ruby. At 11-years-old, Ruby Chitsey likes to go to work with her mom.*

*Amanda is a nurse who travels to several nursing homes in the area. And it was on one of those visits, that Ruby started going up to residents with her notepad, asking them if they could have any three things, what would they be.*

*“I don't think she had an intention, really,” Amanda said. Ruby said she was mostly just curious what they'd say. “I was very surprised. I thought people would say money, houses, a Lamborghini,” Ruby said.*

*But, instead, here's what she got: electric razor, new shoes, Vienna sausage, for some reason a lot of people asked for Vienna sausage and other really basic items. “Like, that's all they wanted. And I really decided that I needed to do something,” Ruby said.*

*So she started a charity called, “Three Wishes for Ruby's Residents.”*

*Now, while her mom is caring for patients, Ruby goes room-to-room, jots down wishes and then sets out to grant those wishes. Ruby has a ‘GoFundMe’ to cover costs, but again, no one is asking for a sports car here. Her expenses are minimal, especially compared to the rewards. “It really lifts you, it really does,” Ruby said.*

*On this day, she came back with a wheelchair full of sausages and other grocery items. But make no mistake, this isn't about food. Whether she knows it or*

*not, Ruby is satisfying some much more basic human needs here, to be remembered, to be cherished especially by a child. That is what our seniors are truly hungry for. That is what Ruby brings every time she sets foot in a nursing home.*

*Who needs a Lamborghini when you've got home delivery of all the happy you can handle.”*

This story reminds me of some verses in Scripture on how we're to take care of one another. Philippians 2:4 says, “Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others.” James 1:27 tells us, “Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to visit orphans and widows in their affliction, and to keep oneself unstained from the world.” And Galatians 6:10 invites us, “So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith.”

Here at Trinity we have a number of people who are homebound. And while they don't have the opportunity to come to church, we as the church can come to them. As we have opportunity, let's call and visit, love on, and do good to these brothers and sisters of faith. Our children and youth have started doing this by creating and delivering Thanksgiving fruit turkeys and Valentine's Day treats. Let's follow their lead and let our homebound members know, not only of God's love, but of our love too.

Most of you have redoubtably heard of Lutheran Hour Ministries. This organization broadcasts Christian Hope through the airways. Now there is a new opportunity to expand their ministry because of favorable political conditions in Egypt. Because of continued war and terrorist bombings, refugee families throughout the Middle East are misplaced and searching for hope. Sharing God's Word can be provided by expanding LHM located in Cairo, Egypt. It is broadcast in Egyptian dialect, the most widely known dialect of the Arab speaking Middle East. Give to MITES to help Lutheran Hour Ministries expand their ministry in this war torn region of the world.



## JAM Ministries

Several people have asked what JAM means in our ministry program. The letters stand for **Jesus And Me**. Our goal is to reach out to others as Jesus reached out to everyone in His ministry. These are some of our activities in 2019.



1. On February 9, we reached out to our college students. We packed and shipped 23 boxes of goodies and devotional material to them.
2. On March 9, Fran Boatman arranged for a group of us to have a guided tour of the early 20<sup>th</sup> century Lamberton Conservatory in Highland Park. Hosting our tour was Noelle Nagel, the staff horticulturalist. Noelle provided expert advice to all gardening questions and gave a very informative tour of the plants in the Conservatory. This was a wonderful opportunity for fellowship. It was so uplifting to see and smell the spring blooms while the snow still covered the outside ground.
3. On April 6, Jean Bauch will speak to us about nutrition. This is open to our whole congregation, both men and women, and we hope you will attend on that Saturday at 10:00AM.
4. We are trying to reach out to those in need by continuing to make quilts for Lutheran World Relief. If you would like to help tie the quilt layers together, we meet on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesdays of each month. The completed quilts will be shipped in May.
5. Ladies Night Out will be in June. This is another way we try to reach out to all women with an opportunity for fellowship. Look for more details in next month's Triune.

JAM Ministries will continue to reach out to our congregation, our community, and our world through service and programs. Look for events sponsored by us in the church Triune or bulletin.

## Building Maintenance Committee

The Building Maintenance Committee met on March 5<sup>th</sup> to discuss items primarily related to work to repair water infiltration into the west wall of the Mary Martha Hall. Also, to discuss finalizing costs for lighting of the Sanctuary. Gary Smith attended the meeting and is pursuing a second bid for work to repair the infiltration problem.

A “photometric” analysis of the Sanctuary lighting needs will be conducted to best determine what types of lighting and how many lights will be required.

Handrails were also discussed. There are 3 doors for which these have been proposed: the main entrance; the entrance near the Pastor’s office; and the exit door leading out from the stairwell. Estimates for installation of handrails will be collected.

There is a new state regulation concerning battery operated smoke detectors that have removable batteries. As of April 1<sup>st</sup>, all such detectors cannot be sold. Existing smoke detectors now in the Church are not directly affected by this new law but the building inspector for the town of Ogden suggests all detectors more than 6 or 7 years old be replaced with the new type of detectors. Such older detectors in the Church will be replaced with new 10-year types that have non-replaceable batteries.

## Stewardship Moment

### Triumpe

In ancient Rome the population was very much familiar with the Emperor's triumphal march through the streets of Rome to proclaim his sovereignty over the Roman Empire. At that time the Emperor laid claim to being "God on Earth" and would celebrate that reputation of divinity within this grandiose parade.

The elements of that event were firmly established and had been performed faithfully for years. The beginning of this event always started at "The Praetorian Guard", they were the Emperor's body guard that amounted to a military escort and guaranteed the divine claim being made. At this point the Praetorians would take a robe off of a god and frequently the Roman gods were dressed, so the robe which was always purple, a royal color, might have been removed from Zeus and placed on the Emperor to make the connection between him and the gods. They would then put a wreath shaped crown on his head to further accentuate the deity connection. They would then acclaim him perhaps chanting, "Hail Caesar, Hail Caesar, Emperor, Dominator, Emperor" as they stood and extolled their emperor as lord and god.

The procession would start from the Praetorian down the Via Sacra and as with any pageant such as this the street was lined with people trying to get a glimpse of this lord and god, and as the procession went on there would be altars set up at intervals along the way with incense burning such that the whole city would be filled with the aroma of incense and according to reports the equivalent of millions of dollars might be spent just for incense. The procession would wend its way through the city until it arrived at Capitoline Hill, called "Head Hill" or "Capite" because of a legend around the finding of a complete human skull during some of the excavation there. Throughout the promenade there would be a bull lead that was to be sacrificed once the spectacle ended at the Temple of Jupiter which was on "Head Hill". Once they had arrived at the Temple of Jupiter the Emperor was offered a glass of wine and traditionally he would refuse it and even pour it out on the ground. There is some discussion as to what the meaning of dumping the wine could be but perhaps he was saying I will give my life for my country. Once the wine was refused, the bull was sacrificed, the pieces of the bull put on the altar and the blood poured into the earth. At that point the Emperor would ascend the staircase up to the Temple of Jupiter and traditionally there would be two other very important men on either side of him but a little lower than him to honor Caesar as lord and god. The crowds stand there witnessing this,

expecting prosperity and success and acclaiming "Hail Caesar Lord and God, Hail Caesar Lord and God. Now was the time to be looking for a sign of acknowledgement from the gods, during Julius Caesar's memorial service a comet appeared in the sky for several days which they received as a sign that he was ascending to the gods and inferentially that his son Caesar Augustus was the son of god on earth.

The Gospel of Mark was written in Italy and primarily for Roman believers. They faced the disparagement that the one they worshiped had been arrested and executed by an agent of the Roman Government. How would they explain that the one they exalted would allow that to happen?

So let's take a look at the Triumpe (tree um' pā) pageantry and how Mark has woven it into his Gospel. The very first words out of Mark's mouth were that Jesus was The Son of God and the prophesied Messiah, leaving no doubt in the mind of the reader what His station was. Throughout Mark's gospel he reinforces that assertion with examples of Jesus' power over the forces of nature (Mark 4:37-41), walking on water (Mark 6:48-51), miracles of healing (Mark 1:30-31), (Mark 2:3-12), (Mark 5:25-29), (Mark 7:31-37) and power over death (Mark 5:37-39) but the most important event in Mark's mind was Jesus' ability to conquer His own death and rise from the grave proving that no power has authority over Him. Within the Gospel he presents Jesus' instructions as to how you should live your life and in (Mark 2:5) he talks about faith, in (Mark 4:40) he talks about trust, in (Mark 5:36) believe God, in (Mark 8:35) follow Christ, in (Mark 9:35) God's will, and in (Mark 10:21) sacrifice. Once Mark presented Jesus' DNA he proceeded to stealthily weave the pageantry of the Roman Triumph into the story of the Crucifixion.

It started in the Praetorium (Mark 15:16) where the whole company of soldiers "Put a Purple Robe on Him", then "They Fashioned a Crown of Thorns and Set it on Him", then they commenced to proclaim "Hail, King of the Jews" again and again, "Falling on Their Knees They Paid Homage to Him". They put His own clothes back on Him, then they led him out to crucify Him. Jesus was the "Emperor" and the "Sacrifice". They brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means "the place of the skull") (Head Hill). Then they offered him wine mixed with myrrh, but he did not take it (He was already giving His life for everyone). The sacrifice began but to retain the pattern Mark records that two rebels were crucified with Him, one on His right and one on His left. While nowhere between the Praetorium and the crucifixion were there shouts of

recognition, approval or honor, Mark needed to present an accurate presentation of the events of that day. Now we must look for God's endorsement, and it comes first at noon as the sky darkened and stayed that way until 3:00. Shortly after 3:00 Jesus died and the second event, the tearing of the Temple Curtain mysteriously occurred. Mark even records the Roman Centurion proclaiming, "Surely this man was the Son of God".

Paul says in (2 Corinthians 2:14-17) *"But thanks be to God, who always leads us as captives in Christ's triumphal procession and uses us to spread the aroma of the knowledge of him everywhere. For we are to God the pleasing aroma of Christ among those who are being saved and those who are perishing. To the one we are an aroma that brings death; to the other, an aroma that brings life. And who is equal to such a task? Unlike so many, we do not peddle the word of God for profit. On the contrary, in Christ we speak before God with sincerity, as those sent from God."*

Are you ready to join Christ's Triumphal Procession, even if it ends at "Head Hill"?


