From the Pastor's Desk

“Wait While God Works”

Over the course of the last several weeks, I've talked with people who have struggled with sickness, pain, seeking direction, and knowing God's will. I'd like to share with you a reflection from Christian author, pastor, and teacher Max Lucado. In his book, "You'll Get Through This: Hope and Help for Your Turbulent Times," he writes a chapter entitled "Wait While God Works." I hope and pray that these words and the fact that God is working may give you renewed hope and strength!

"So here I sit in the waiting room. The receptionist took my name, recorded my insurance data, and gestured to a chair. "Please have a seat. We will call you when the doctor is ready." I look around. A mother holds a sleeping baby. A fellow dressed in a suit thumbs through *Time* magazine. A woman with a newspaper looks at her watch, sighs, and continues the task of the hour: waiting.

The task at hand is the name of the room: the waiting room. We in the waiting room understand our assignment: to wait. We don't treat each other. I don't ask the nurse for a stethoscope or blood pressure cuff. I don't pull up a chair next to the woman with a newspaper and say, "Tell me what prescriptions you are taking." That's the job of the nurse. My job is to wait. So I do.

Can't say I like it. Time moves like an Alaskan glacier. The clock ticks every five minutes, not every second. We don't like to wait. We are the giddy up generation. We weave through traffic, looking for the faster lane. We frown at the person who takes eleven items into the ten-item express checkout. We drum our fingers while the song downloads or the microwave heats our coffee. We want six-pack abs in ten minutes and minute rice in thirty seconds. We don't like to wait. Not on the doctor, the traffic, or the pizza. What about God?

Take a moment and look around you. Do you realize where we sit? This planet is God's waiting room. The

young couple in the corner? Waiting to get pregnant. The fellow with the briefcase? He has resumes all over the country, waiting on work. The elderly woman with the cane? A widow. Been waiting a year for one tearless day. Waiting. Waiting on God to give, help, heal. Waiting on God to come. We indwell the land betwixt prayer offered and prayer answered. The land of waiting.

Are you in God's waiting room? If so, here is what you need to know: While you wait, God works. Jesus says in John 5:17: "*My Father is always at his work...*" (NIV) God never twiddles his thumbs. He never stops. He takes no vacations. Just because you are idle, don't assume God is. "*Be still and know that I am God*" reads the sign on God's waiting room wall. You can be glad because God is good. You can be still because He is active. You can rest because He is busy.

Remember God's word through Moses to the Israelites? Exodus 14:13-14 says that, *Moses answered the people, 'Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the LORD will bring you today. The Egyptians you see today you will never see again. The LORD will fight for you; you need only to be still.'* The Israelites saw the Red Sea ahead of them and heard the Egyptian soldiers thundering after them. Death on both sides. *Don't be afraid, stand firm, and be still? Are you kidding?* But what the former slaves couldn't see was the hand of God at the bottom of the water, creating a path, and his breath from heaven, separating the waters. God was working for them. And He's working for us. God is always at work for the good of everyone who loves him. (Romans 8:28)

To wait, biblically speaking, is not to assume the worst, worry, fret, make demands, or take control. Nor is waiting inactivity. Waiting is a sustained effort to stay focused on God through prayer and belief. To wait is to "*rest in the LORD, and wait patiently for Him, and not to fret...*" (Psalm 37:7)

In one of the most dramatic examples of waiting in the Bible, Daniel kept his mind on God for an extended period. Daniels’ people had been oppressed for almost seventy years. Daniel entered into a time of prayer on their behalf. For twenty-one days he abstained from pleasant food, meat, and wine. He labored in prayer. He persisted, pleaded, and agonized. Then on the twenty-second day a breakthrough: An angel of God appeared. He revealed to Daniel the reason for the long delay. Daniel’s prayer was heard on the first day it was offered. The angel was dispatched with a response. *“Fear not, Daniel, for from the first day that you set your heart to understand and humbled yourself before God, your words have been heard, and I have come because of your words. The prince of the kingdom of Persia withstood me twenty-one days, but Michael, one of the chief princes, came to help me, for I was left there with the kings of Persia . . .”* (Dan. 10:12-13)

From an earthly perspective nothing was happening. Daniel’s prayers were falling like pebbles on hard ground. But from a heavenly perspective a battle was raging in the heavens. Two angels were engaged in a fierce combat for three weeks. While Daniel was waiting, God was working.

What if Daniel had given up? Lost faith? Walked away from God? Better questions: What if you give up? Lose faith? Walk away?

Don’t. For heaven’s sake, don’t. Keep waiting! For above and around you at this very instant, God’s messengers are at work. Isaiah 40:31 says, *“They who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint.”* Fresh strength, renewed vigor, legs that don’t grow weary. Delight yourself in God, and He will bring rest to your soul.

You’ll get through this waiting room season just fine. Pay careful note, and you will detect the most wonderful surprise. The doctor will step out of his office and take the seat next to yours. *“Just thought I’d keep you company while you are waiting.”* Not every physician will do that, but yours will. After all, he is the Great Physician.”

For our Lenten Fill the Pew project we will be helping Food for the Poor, an interdenominational Christian ministry. Food For The Poor is one of the largest international relief and development organizations in the United States.

They spread God's unconditional love as they minister to the poorest of the poor in 17 countries throughout the Caribbean and Latin America.

By providing lifesaving food, secure housing, clean water, healthcare, emergency relief, micro-enterprise projects and education opportunities, we are giving the poor a chance at a better future.

Brochures will be made available before Lent begins on Ash Wednesday. Donations can be left in the basket at the front of the church.

Every six cents provides a nourishing meal for a hungry person living in grinding poverty. A gift of \$14.60 will feed a needy family for a month. A gift of \$10 will provide a fruit tree that will produce food for a family for years to come.

Food for the Poor operates on an administrative margin of less than 5 percent. That means that more than 95 cents of every dollar donated goes to projects that help the poor.

Each week we will highlight a story from Food for the Poor that demonstrates how this Christ-centered ministry gives the poor a hand up out of poverty.

A Stewardship Moment

Depressed?

The Bible is littered with people who were depressed. Depression can cause you to believe a lie and while the Bible doesn't say outright that Adam & Eve were depressed they did believe the lie that Satan presented to them and if they weren't, by then they certainly were. Cain got depressed because God wasn't accepting his sacrifices, as a result he believed the lie that Able was the cause of his troubles and as a result perpetrated the first murder.

For me the winter time is when I am most susceptible to the forces of depression and as a Christian I often ask the questions. "If Jesus has achieved the victory, why am I so sad? If God reigns and is working to redeem creation, why am I mired in hopelessness and exhaustion before the day begins?" Thankfully, as medical science continues to learn more about the brain and how to effectively treat conditions like depression, the imputation of secret sin is lifted and many of the misconceptions surrounding depression are being dismantled.

Jonah suffered multiple bouts of depression, certainly spending 3 days in the "Belly of the Whale" was depressing and he spoke of that despondency in ([Jonah 2](#)) and the Lord rescued him but he was still a reluctant prophet and the success that he achieved in Nineveh caused an even greater depression ([Jonah 4:1-3](#)) such that he asked to die. Should success cause a person to become depressed? When the results are not to your liking I guess it does.

Like Jonah, Elijah went from success to deep depression but the circumstances were some different, his success was to his liking but fear of Queen Jezebel, the disappointment of a fruitless ministry, the lack of action on the part of the country to combat the pagan gods and the diminution of his spiritual comrades led him to despondency such that he too desired death. Elijah was plagued with the fear that his ministry was ineffective and perhaps pointless. That fear drove him into the wilderness (a place of symbolic death, loneliness, despair and hopelessness) where he petitioned God to end his life ([1 Kings 19:3-5](#)). The Lord wasn't through with Elijah, He sent an angel to minister to him who implemented the "3 Part Remedy". "Take a Nap, Eat a Snack", the angel provided food and after Elijah had eaten he slept, again the angel came with more food and presumably instructions to go to Horeb. "Quiet Times", as a result of this rest & recuperation Elijah had the strength to proceed to the "Mountain of God"

where he encountered God in a "Still Small Voice", which reassures us that as big as God is He is small enough and quiet enough to be accessible to us on an individual basis. "Seek Support From Your Community", after Elijah vented his frustration of "doing what God had told him but to no avail, fear of repercussion from the "Powers That Be" and the loneliness of having no associates, God reassured him that even though he felt alone there were 7000 others in his corner and gave him specific instructions that would protect him and advance his ministry.

When you read the two accounts of Jonah and Elijah you get a sense of the depth of rejection that they are experiencing but depression is more than sadness, pain or lack of motivation. It is not caring at all and hearing voices in your head that no one else cares for you and that you should not feel anything anymore and you fall into an internalized out of control darkness that convinces you that you are all alone and begs the question, "why are you even here?". These thoughts often lead to an effort to commit suicide, which turns out to be anywhere between the second to the fifth leading cause of death in the middle age groups (10 to 55) and as you see can start as young as 10 years old.

If you don't hear both Jonah and Elijah verbalizing these thoughts, read over these passages again and then realize that both of these people had God to comfort them, to pull them from the "Pit of Despair", and to motivate them again in a constructive direction.

Depression can sometimes be dealt with through medication but when a prescription is written, specific instructions are also provided for the use of that medication. We take the treatment with some expectations and the faith that it will work to provide us with relief. Jesus is the "Great Physician", He also provides us with a prescription, "Study this Book of Instruction Continually" ([Joshua 1:7-9](#)) "Meditate on it day and night so that you will be sure to obey everything written in it and be assured that the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go"

God's prescription for Jonah and Elijah was quite simple, "break out of that 'Pit of Despair' that imprisons your mind and see the world of people that need you and you need them, reject the fear generated by those who unjustly condemn you and get busy performing the ministry that I assigned for you and see the results that I have in store for you".

Prayer is often the best remedy for depression, Jeremiah turned to the Lord and His response is in ([Jeremiah 15:19-21](#)) but Jeremiah lived in the time of the exile and he assumed the responsibility to

revitalize those who had been taken captive. Reading his letter to those in Babylon ([Jeremiah 29:4-23](#)) could be encouraging even in today's culture but the one verse in this passage is definitely the most uplifting ("For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.").

Love: More than an Emotion

Love is described in the dictionary as affection that is felt for another. Love causes one to be devoted to the object of love, whether a person, place, thing or thought. People find the object of their love irresistible. People hold their loves dear and are very keen on these objects.

Love is a consuming sense that has the capacity to control a person's life. To be sure, love triggers the emotional senses, but is love more than emotions?

Martin Luther's explanations to the Ten Commandments began with the words, "*We should fear, LOVE and trust in God so that. . .*" Love, being associated with the words 'fear' and 'trust' tell us that our motivations are entwined.

How interesting that the Apostle whom Jesus loved writes, "*For God so LOVED the world, that He gave His only begotten Son.*" Love is of God!

God told Abraham, when speaking of the son He had promised, to "*Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you LOVE and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him*

there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains of which I shall tell you." Can LOVE for God ever compete with our LOVE for our own family?

Paul, in his letter to the Romans says, "*God's LOVE has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.*" Indeed, LOVE is God's gift, given to us to reflect His desire to bless.

Love is more than an emotion. Love defines our relationships, motivations and priorities. When your last will and testament is read, will your LOVES be evident? Want to talk?

you give to those you touch each day.






