From the Pastor's Desk

“What Happens When We Die?”

One of the many questions asked by people of faith and even people who lack faith. I thought what I would do this month was to offer an article I found in the Lutheran Study Bible that answers that question exactly the way we should... through the words of Scripture. If you have one of these bibles, it is on page 1750. I give you this for two reasons. First, Scripture is filled with hope beyond our lives here. Our Father made promises that He keeps for eternity and when we are going through life's challenges we can hold onto those promises and be comforted. Second, I wanted you to experience one of the articles in this study bible. It is one of the reasons I own one. It is rich in the truth and helps you to dig deep and experience God's love through His Word. I would highly recommend purchasing one through Concordia Publishing House (www.cph.org). Ok, here we go!!

A human is made up of body and soul (Matthew 10:28; 2 Peter 1:13-15). When a human dies, his soul is separated from his body. His body decays, but his soul—and thus he himself, his ego, or personality—lives on. If a person trusts in Jesus for salvation, his soul will live in joy with God, awaiting the resurrection, the last judgment, and eternal life. If a person is wicked and unbelieving, his soul will live in torment, awaiting the resurrection, the last judgment, and eternal condemnation.

In 2 Corinthians 5:4-8, St. Paul describes the body as a “tent” in which he—that is his mind, personality, soul, spirit, or however one might describe the center of one's person—dwells. He says that when he and believing Christians die, they will be “away from the body” (literally, “out of the house of the body”) and yet still “at home with (present with) the Lord.” These passages show clearly that the center of one's personhood, which other passages call “the soul,” can exist separately from the body, and that at death

the soul is separated from the body (Luke 8:55; 23:46; 1 Peter 3:18-19; Philippians 1:23-24; Revelation 6:9.)

What about soul sleep?

In John 11:11-14, our Lord Jesus describes the death of His friend Lazarus as “sleep.” But note: the wicked who die have “no rest” (Isaiah 57:20-21; Revelation 14:11). Death is a “rest” or a “sleep” for the godly (Revelation 14:13, drawing from Psalm 95). Thus, the Church calls the places where the godly are buried “cemeteries,” that is, “dormitories” or places of sleep, and the Church believes that the godly do indeed “rest in peace.”

But while the body sleeps, the soul is awake. For example, in Luke 16:19-31, the soul of the rich man in Hades prays (to no avail) that the beggar Lazarus would relieve his suffering or return to earth to warn his family. The soul of Lazarus, on the other hand, is “comforted” (vs. 25). Both the rich man and faithful Abraham are awake, conscious, and speaking. Scripture sometimes indicates that the departed souls are unaware of what takes place on earth (2 Kings 22:20; Job 14:21; Isaiah 57:1-2; 63:16). Yet it should not be concluded from this that they are unconscious. The soul of the rich man was not unconscious, nor was the soul of Abraham (Matthew 22:32).

In considering “soul sleep,” however, we must distinguish between those people who affirm that the souls of the righteous are comforted and experience God's presence and those who think that the souls of the righteous experience nothing, or worse, or obliterated. As long as the comfort of the righteous souls is affirmed, expressions about the dead being asleep are not dangerous.

But the view that the souls of the righteous experience nothing, or that they are dissipated or annihilated, however, are false, unscriptural views.

Glory and Condemnation on Judgment Day

What is the last judgment about? Scripture teaches that in heaven there are varying degrees of glory and in hell there are varying degrees of condemnation or judgment (Matthew 10:15; 20:23; Luke 14; John 19:11; 1 Corinthians 15:40-42). We should not think about judgment day as though it is the first time that the godly will be distinguished from the wicked (2 Peter 2:3-4, 9; Jude 6), or as though it is the first time that the godly will experience the blessed presence of God. But it will be the first time the godly will fully experience God's presence in their glorified bodies (Luke 16:19-31; John 5:24).

Instead of thinking about Judgment Day as the first time a distinction between the righteous and the wicked, we should see it as the *final and full* awarding of rewards and penalties (2 Corinthians 5:10). Judgment Day is about the fact that we, in our bodies, will receive the things done in the body. Those who have done evil in the body will receive condemnation. Those who, in the body, have believed in Christ, have been forgiven of their sins, and have new life by God's Spirit, will receive rewards. Judgment Day is the full and final rewarding of rewards and penalties, not the beginning of that awarding.

Everlasting Life with Christ

As we have begun to live with Christ here on earth in the Church through His Word and Sacraments, so we will continue to live with Him after we die. Death is not an interruption of this fellowship with our Lord. Our life with Christ continues, even after death, even before the resurrection. Our departed friends and family members who lived with Christ here below by faith in His cross for their forgiveness even now live with Him and are comforted. Because our life with Christ is not interrupted by death, death for the Christian may be sweet and joyful, even in the midst of tears.

Ron graduated from Cass Technical High School, Detroit, Michigan. After serving his country in the US Air Force he followed his calling and received his diploma from Concordia Theological Seminary in Springfield, Illinois.

Congregations served by this faithful man of God; Granville, Ohio, Christ Lutheran, Oil City, Pa. Luther Memorial, Blackwood, NJ, St. Paul Lutheran, Batavia, NY. He penned Lord, I Believe, a weekly article published in the Batavia Daily News. After "retiring" in 1995 he continued serving as a visiting or interim minister in St. Matthew, Rochester, NY, Faith Lutheran, Elma, NY, Concordia (Hope) Brockport, NY, Trinity Lutheran, Spencerport, NY, St. John, Hamlin, NY, St. Luke, Cheektowaga, NY, First Trinity, Tonawanda, NY, St. Johns, Farmington, NY.

Despite suffering a stroke while on vacation in Florida he continued to serve his Lord by preaching the Gospel. He held Bible Class and Worship Services in the Senior Living Community of Calusa Harbor, Fort Myers and Brookdale Southside, Jacksonville, Fl. up until the week he left this life. Stewardship Moment Clean

Easter is a distant image in the rearview mirror, but hopefully not forgotten. One thing that isn't given perhaps all the importance that it should and yet Jesus proclaimed it as having great importance. So much so that when Peter objected to Jesus whom he had recently declared as being "The Son of The Living God" offered to wash his feet, Jesus said, *"If I do not wash you, you have no share with me."*

John's Gospel is the only one to present Jesus's "Foot Washing" incident but Jesus's message is clear and reverberated in different places in all the other Gospels. That message being, *"If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet."* The message is a little cloaked here but what He has said elsewhere is, *"Whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be your slave,"* The impact of Jesus, the one that all of the Disciples revered as being the "Greatest Man Alive" would lower Himself to a position normally occupied by the lowest slave of the household must have left an indelible image in John's brain and one that he found necessary to share with other readers of his Gospel.

As with other events of the Bible this one appears in other parts of the Bible. However, it is discussed in different contexts.

In Exodus 30:17-21 God told Moses, *"Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Make a bronze basin, with its bronze stand, for washing. Place it between the tent of meeting and the altar, and put water in it. Aaron and his sons are to wash their hands and feet with water from it. Whenever they enter the tent of meeting, they shall wash with water so that they will not die. Also, when they approach the altar to minister by presenting a food offering to the Lord, they shall wash their hands and feet so that they will not die. This is to be a lasting ordinance for Aaron and his descendants for the generations to come.'*" It appears as if God saw this event as "Very Important" if lives were at stake through negligence.

Make no mistake Jesus was "Very Serious" when He commented in Matthew 5:17-18 about abolition and fulfillment of the "Law" that we often feel free from. While His "Gift" sacrifice provides us with some freedom around our adherence to those laws, never the less we are still subject to them.

Let's take a look at the event of the "Upper Room" through the lens of Exodus 30. In the First Century foot

washing was basically a sign of hospitality but for Jesus, His objective was much more than that. These men were about to enter "The Tent of Meeting" and take part in an unparalleled worship service that would culminate in Jesus's "Sacrificial" death. Understandably they had no clue what was about to happen. Jesus's comment to Peter about "having no part in Him" might have offered some insight but nothing Jesus had said regarding His demise to that point had really sunk in. So, here is Jesus washing the feet of the "Disciples", "So They Would Not Die" while they took part in Jesus's offering Himself as a "Blood Sacrifice" to His "Heavenly Father" on an altar devised by pagan gentiles, prophesied by David His "Earthly Father" and recorded in Psalm 22. Was this not a fulfillment of Exodus 30?

That's not all folks!! In Leviticus 8, the Lord instructs Moses as to what he must do to Ordain Aaron and His Sons. The process that Moses went through was more extensive than the one Jesus went through on Maundy Thursday but if you compare the components of each of these events you will see many similarities. Really, Jesus was preparing these men for the "Priesthood" and while they were supposedly celebrating "The Passover", in reality what was happening that night was Jesus ordaining these men into the priesthood of "His Gospel". They wouldn't understand any of this until after Sunday when Jesus showed them He was "Undefeated".

When Jesus completed His "Rite of Ordination", He left the Disciples with rather interesting instructions. He said that they should be washing one another's feet, but that was only to build on the next statement which eluded to them being the "Servant" not the "Master". Were these instructions just for the disciples?

Apparently, Peter didn't believe that was so. In his letter to the "Persecuted Christians" in Asia Minor he wrote, (1 Peter 2:9-10) *"You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy."* Peter seems to think that all those who lay claim to being Christian could be considered Priests.

Paul had a slightly different approach in his second letter to the Corinthians (5:19-21), *"In Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to*

God." Paul may have been eluding to the "We" being "Him" but since Paul is no longer with us, if those "Ambassador" responsibilities are to be fulfilled the assignment will be "Yours and Mine", should you choose to accept the Mission.

Let's not be confused though, as with our government so too in Christianity, there are those who are selected to perform certain functions and assume certain responsibilities in "The Church" and those individuals are there to ensure that "The Church" functions correctly and the congregants remain on that "Narrow Path" described by Jesus. However, just as Paul (Acts 17:11) characterized "The Bereans" as "Being More Nobel" because, even though they received the message of Paul with great eagerness, they examined the Scriptures to certify that Paul was giving them the "Truth".

So it is, Salvation has been bought and freely given by Jesus, yet living your life as a "Christ Follower", in the words of Jesus (Mark 8:34-35), *"If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it."* is a bit more complicated.
